Visit the NVMM for a Washington (\$1) on Presidents Day! Presidential Trivia with prizes, Scavenger Hunt and more Hands-On Activities

(COLUMBUS, Ohio) – For a Washington (one dollar) admission, guests can experience the National Veterans Memorial and Museum (NVMM) and enjoy special programming on <u>Presidents Day</u>, Monday, February 19.

"We are welcoming families and friends to the NVMM on Presidents Day to learn about Veterans who became U.S. Presidents and enjoy fun, hands-on activities for a Washington, making it an affordable educational opportunity," said Andy Cloyd, NVMM museum director. "Guests of all ages connect with U.S. history through our core story-telling exhibitions as well as our current traveling exhibition, <u>Lost Man</u> Blues: Jon Schueler – Art and War."

Special activities for Presidents Day include:

- Presidential Trivia with prizes at noon and 2 p.m.
- Presidential Scavenger Hunt in the museum throughout the day
- Hands-on Navigation Activity featuring our newest exhibition, <u>Lost Man Blues: Jon Schueler Art and War</u>. Guests can track John Schueler's flight path from a January 1943 bombing run to St. Nazaire using navigation instruments.
- Explore real flight computers in the Tuskegee Airmen Alcove.

Additionally, the NVMM is participating in <u>America 250-Ohio's Fourth Grade History Pass</u> which provides free museum admission to each Ohio fourth grader accompanied by a paying adult.
