Compelling Question for this Lesson

- How can military service impact an individual after they separate from service?
 - Lesson created by Jon Conway, The Ohio State University, B.A. in Child & Youth Services

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Lesson Instruction

Begin by asking the students: "What comes to mind when you think about military service?"

Use the slides presentation to provide a brief overview of what military service was like during the Civil War. Students should take notes and refer to the compelling question. Remind students that non-combat service is vital to the war effort. Many people think of combat when they think of the military. It is important to highlight that service comes in many different forms of jobs and duties.

Learning Check Questions

- What are some examples of non-combat service roles in the military?
- How did military service during the Civil War help form new communities?

Stations

- Assign students into groups to explore how the lives of several key figures who served during the Civil War were impacted by their service.
- Use the "Stations Worksheet" to help guide student learning.

Reflection

Students will conduct research on one of the four figures from the "Stations Worksheet" and consider how their service impacted what they did after separating from military service. Reflection essay should be 150-200 words.
